The Mill Site Property Advisory Committee in September recommended that the City of Marine purchase a piece of property within the historical mill site. The Minnesota Historical Society (MNHS),

which owns the larger property, is currently agreeable to the sale of the parcel for \$1.

CELL TOWER ON SCHEDULE FOR CONSTRUCTION IN 2025



Planned cell tower construction in Marine on St. Croix is on track for 2025. The tower will be built on City-owned property near the yard-compost site west of Highway 95. In September, Councilman Charlie Anderson reported to Council that the companies partnering to build the tower, SMC Holdings and Vinco, have been taking survey measurements and engaging with prospective carriers.

LOCAL CANNABIS REGULATIONS COMING SOON

The Marine on St. Croix Planning Commission and City Council are continuing work on a draft ordinance regulating commercial cultivation and retail of cannabis and, where applicable, hemp.

Although a public hearing for the draft ordinance has not been set, it is expected to take place in late November. **Residents interested in following this process or commenting on the draft should look for a draft ordinance to be released on the City's website in late October.**



Know Before You Grow Growing Cannabis for Personal Use

Minnesota residents ages 21+ can now cultivate up to eight cannabis plants at home — no license needed. The fine print: No more than four of those plants can be mature at a time. And although it's legal to grow them in your yard, the plants must be in an enclosed, locked space that is not open to public view.

Regulating Cannabis in Marine: 6 Things to Know

1. Minnesota cities cannot ban cannabis retail.

The state requires all municipalities to allow cannabis retail uses in some fashion. Cities may choose to limit the number of retail licenses in the city to one license per 12,500 residents. For Marine, this means that the City must allow for the potential establishment of at least one cannabis retail business.

2. Local governments must allow cultivation and other cannabisrelated activities.

Like the requirement to allow retail, municipalities cannot ban cannabis cultivation, processing, transport, storage, or temporary events. These uses must be allowed in some way within the city boundaries.

3. Cities can set reasonable restrictions on time, place, and manner of cannabis business operations. The City of Marine has the authority to:

- Limit hours of operation to the hours between 10 a.m. and 9 p.m., seven days a week.
- Set limited buffers around schools, day cares, playgrounds, and athletic fields where cannabis businesses may not be located.
- Determine the appropriate zoning districts for each type of cannabis business based on the activities allowed under their license type.

4. Smoking, vaping, and cannabis consumption are not allowed in Marine's public spaces.

Cannabis consumption – smoking, vaping, eating, drinking – has been prohibited in Marine's public spaces since August 2023 (City Code, Chapter 32). This includes parks, sidewalks, and streets. Smoking and vaping are allowed on privately-owned outdoor premises such as a

restaurant patio, pursuant to the same regulations as tobacco.

5. The City of Marine is balancing new rules with local community needs.

Regulations will permit the City of Marine to allow for the adult-use cannabis businesses required by the state while limiting potential negative impacts on neighbors, children, and public safety.

6. The ordinance will evolve over time.

Because state cannabis laws are so new, our local ordinance will almost certainly need modifications in the future. Once the City of Marine has tried and tested its regulations, and if there is evidence of market demand, the limits set this year could be changed.

COUNCIL ADOPTS RESOLUTION RE: BROOKSIDE LEGAL APPEAL

The Marine on St. Croix City Council on Sept. 23 adopted a resolution clarifying its position on the pending Minnesota Court of Appeals case, Brookside Hospitality Company, LLC, d/b/a Brookside Bar & Grill, vs. City of Marine on Saint Croix. ency, the City desires to clarify the background of the current situation with the zoning regulations; and, Brookside Hospitality Company, LLC, d/ Brookside Bar & Grill (the "Brookside"); and,

WHEREAS, the Brookside remains a valuable local business and the City desires to see it continue to be successful, while abiding by the same reasonable regulations all local businesses are required to follow. The City's commitment to the Brookside's success is underscored by its willingness to allow, free of cost or charge, an encroachment onto Judd Street for the addition of a vestibule, and the storage of all the Brookside's garbage and grease dumpsters on City property, and further by its refusal to impose more restrictions on its day-to-day operations; and,

WHEREAS, the City's Planning Commission, in an April 2024 pre-application meeting, reviewed the Brookside's preliminary expansion plans for outdoor dining, landscaping and bandshell enhancements, and the Brookside was in-

WHEREAS, those local and state regulations require a standard public process;

WHEREAS, the City advised that such a process requires a public hearing while balancing of mutual interests in business growth but also neighborhood/citizen impacts relating to traffic, parking, emergency vehicle access, building capacity and noise. After exploring the process, however, the Brookside declined to pursue a conditional use permit; and,

WHEREAS, the City was advised by the Minnesota Department of Public Safety Alcohol and Gambling Enforcement Division that state law required an "On Sale" liquor license include a "complete description of the compact and contiguous area" where liquor would be served, and that the two "On Sale" liquor licenses in the City were deficient. As a result, the City moved forward to amend both liquor licenses in the City to comport with state law; and,

WHEREAS, in the interest of transpar- formed that such plans would trigger WHEREAS, the City amended the Brookside's liquor license consistent with what the Brookside had previously represented as its service area, including addressing the grassy area so as to comport with state law; and,

> WHEREAS, the Brookside initiated a lawsuit to challenge the amendment to its liquor license. This matter is currently pending at the Minnesota Court of Appeals and is entitled Brookside Hospitality Company, LLC, d/b/a Brookside Bar & Grill, vs. City of Marine on Saint Croix, Appellate Court Case No. A24-1257; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY STATES AND RESOLVES AS FOLLOWS:

The City remains committed to working with the Brookside to find a reasonable resolution to this matter that comports with state and local law and balances the public interest.


ological surveys to confirm that no items of historical significance are located on that portion of the property, which sits just off of Judd St. If the sale happens, MNHS would still own the portion of the property with remnants of the former milling operation.

The group held two public engagement sessions in late July, and said participant feedback on acquiring the parcel was positive. Most attendees' ideas for how to use the parcel fell into one of three categories:

- Interpretive center for heritage, the river, or natural re-
- Multi-use community building (library, town hall, museum, folk school)
- **Public restrooms**

The committee reported that it had considered other options, such as buying the entire property or exploring a joint powers agreement that would allow the City to build on MNHS property. Ultimately, they advised purchasing the property, which would offer greater stability for investments while retaining current funding for site maintenance through MNHS.

Council moved the proposal to planning commission, which must review any public land acquisitions. The commission hopes to complete its review in late October.



The land proposed for purchase, outlined in blue, sits near the existing footpath on the east side of Judd St. It is far enough away from the bluff line to allow for development, but would still be limited by state and local regulations governing the Lower St. Croix Riverway and historic sites.

- Bow Hunting September 14 December 31 Shotgun November 9 17 •
- Muzzle Loader November 30- December 15 •

Within Marine's city limits, permits are required for anyone hunting with a firearm (Ch. 9, Section 1). These permits are available at the City office during regular business hours.


Property owners interested in allowing bow hunters on their

Reminders for People Who Don't Hunt

- Be aware while walking trails and entering parks.
- Parks may hold a special hunting period.
- Wear bright orange clothing.



Firearms hunting is allowed by permit in the Single Family Rural and St. Croix Rural zoning districts (light yellow and light blue above). The property owner must give permission and a permit must be obtained through the City Office.



TRASH TROUBLE?

Call the city office with your trash-related questions or to report missed pick up. City staff are the primary contact between Marine on St. Croix residents and the city's garbage hauler, Waste Management.

FALL-WINTER PARKING

PARK OFF STREET OVERNIGHT

November 15 - April 1, no parking is allowed on streets or alleys from 2 am - 6 am. This includes downtown businesses and apartment residents.

Clear streets allow public works to plow, keeping the roads drivable. Between 2 and 6 am the City has authority to tow your vehicle at your expense, per Ch. 24 of the city code.
